Course objectives	Student's benefits
The course provides a concise introduction to the poetry of Elizabethan and Stuart England (1558–1649). It is aimed chiefly at undergraduate students taking courses on sixteenth and seventeenth- century English literature (poetry). The beginnings of what we now describe as 'Renaissance' or 'Early Modern' English literature precede the accession of Elizabeth I (1558), but Renaissance literary culture only became firmly established in England in the second half of the sixteenth century. Similarly, while the literature produced between 1649 and the Restoration of the Monarchy (1660) could be said to belong to the Renaissance, the unusual historical context in which it was produced, marks the Interregnum as a distinctive literary era.
