By analyzing various poems, we will understand that the authors produced the brilliant outpouring of poetry in Renaissance England. Authors studied include Wyatt, Sidney, Marlowe, Spenser, Donne, Jonson, Herbert , Herrick , Marvell, and Milton. Other then the group of fantastic poets from both centuries, the course also provides an introduction to Renaissance poetry.

Teaching methodology: Lectures, seminars, tests, presentations, final exam

Both lectures and seminar classes. Students must complete the readings for the selected authors and attend all lectures. Through readings, lectures, class discussions, and tests, students will increase their understanding of the Renaissance poetry and culture. Further, they will refine their analytic reading and writing, and discussion skills
